Every year at this time, we here at Washington Wine Central, up in little 'ol Anacortes look back over the last year to reflect on the 10 Washington reds and 5 whites that blew us away. This is our own, extremely subjective, biased and politically incorrect assessment of what we have tasted over the last year. Unlike the other guys, we don't do it blind, we don't require wines to be submitted and we do wait until the whole year is over (seriously, a 'wines of the year' list that is written in August?). In fact, many of these wines are not even available for us to sell anymore, so blatant sales expectations are not part of the picture either. We pick those wines that really spoke to us, our customers and maybe they sold well, maybe they didn't. There are a couple of ground rules: none of our own wines are allowed, i.e.; No BBQ or ded. reckoning or any other custom bottling done for us. We only will pick one wine per winery. But if there are multiple wines nominated by the staff, the winery is in the running for 'Winery of the Year'. Two obvious choices that would probably be on this list every year have been grandfathered into the de-facto 'Compass Wines Hall of Fame' to make room for everybody else; Leonetti and Quilceda Creek, so they will not ever appear on here again, unless some monumental thing happens like the first 101 point wine or the first winery to get a perfect score on every wine they make. If a winemaker makes wines for multiple labels, they are looked at as a hired gun and the wines are all open for this process. We won't try to breakdown the source of the juice or who blended it or who punched it down. The winery takes 'ownership' not the winemaker(s). And finally, even though all the staff participates in the process of picking the wines, I am the autocratic dictator here, so the final decisions are all mine.

Washington Wine of the Year Coach House Cellars Garage Red \$12.99

What a breath of fresh air this wine is! From tiny Coach House Cellars in Bellingham comes this scrumptious, Bordeaux style blend of mostly Sheridan Vineyard fruit, which just did not make the cut for their varietal wines. Add in the great price and the classy, understated package and you have a home run that we just cannot keep in stock. A unanimous staff pick. Bravo!

Washington Winemaker of the Year Chris Gorman

This is a new one for me, but this is my sand box so I can break the rules. We had multiple wineries with multiple nominations for this list, but Chris made 5 different wines that got votes, from three different brands: Gorman, Ashan and Force Majeure, so he gets the nod for stud of the year. If he keeps this up, we may have to bar him from future competitions. To make it even more significant, he was nominated for wines using three different grapes. Great job Chris!

WASHINGTON'S TOP 10 REDS

Washington's top 10 red wines of the year in alphabetical order

Betz Family Winery Columbia Valley 'Clos du Betz' 2012 \$61.99

Bob Betz is one of the grand masters of the state, and it is always hard to pick a favorite amongst his releases. However, this year, the 'Clos du Betz' takes the prize. Toasted coconut, chocolate and black cherry abound in this brilliant example of a Bordeaux style blend.

Bontzu

Walla Walla Valley 'GSM' 2013 \$25.99

A newcomer to us and the rest of the wine world, but look out, we have a budding star on our hands. Every wine we tasted from this Walla Walla rookie was delicious and this one only just edged out the Malbec to make this list. A winery to watch in a big way.

Force Majeure Red Mountain 'Collaboration Series V' 2012 \$90.99

Force Majeure is in the process of moving over from the system of using Washington wine makers, to using their own, so this may be the swan song for this wine as we know it, but damn, what a stunner. Chris Gorman may have crafted my favorite Red Mountain Cab of all time.

Golden Ridge Walla Walla Valley Merlot 2012 \$29.99

We have been fans of this small and unassuming winery since day one for their Cabernet, but this is the first example of Merlot we have seen from them and it is a real eye opener. Not only is it the best Merlot I had all year, but the price is about half of what it could be. A major bargain.

Gorman 'Old Scratch' Red Mountain Cabernet Sauvignon 2013 \$28.99

Finding a great Cabernet in Washington has gotten pretty easy to do and Chris Gorman has made his fair share. However, finding a wine of this quality, from this rock star of a winemaker for this price, is something new. One of the surprise new wines of the year.

Latta Wines Snipes Mountain, Upland Vineyard Grenache 2011 \$39.99

Neck and neck with Two Vintners for the best Grenache I have ever tasted from Washington, Andrew Latta is quickly becoming a force to be reckoned with in this state. Gorgeous fruit, impeccable acidity and serious stuff. His Malbec and Roussane were also in the running.

Owen Roe Dubrul Vineyard Cabernet Sauvignon 2013 \$75.99

Owen Roe is a name that has been famous in the PNW for years, but since the focus has moved to Washington recently, the Yakima portfolio just keeps getting better. The Yakima Valley Red was also nominated, but this one takes the prize. Fabulous Cabernet here.

Terra Blanca 'Arch Terrace' Red Mountain Syrah 2010 \$14.99

I judged this at the Pacific Northwest Invitational Wine Competition with a bunch of other wine pros, and our panel was convinced that this was one of the big name Syrahs from the 'Rocks' in Walla Walla. Lots of exotic game, coffee, smoke and deep berry. A fantastic value.

Two Vintners Boushey Vineyard Grenache 2013 \$30.99

Morgan Lee just seems to get better and better with each release. The future for Grenache in Washington is huge, and this is a perfect example of why. Likely my favorite example of this grape ever made in this state. Stunning stuff! One of four 2V wines nominated.

Woodinville Wine Cellars 'Reserve' Cabernet Sauvignon 2012 \$50.99

Sean Boyd does not make this wine every year, so when he does, one needs to take notice. Full of power and muscle, it also does it with layers of dark chocolate, cassis and fine grained tannins. It has been nicknamed 'the Eagle Eater' for the third time for good reason. Who needs Napa?



Washington's top 5 white wines in alphabetical order

Ashan

Barrel Fermented Columbia Valley Chardonnay 2014 \$21.99

Chris Gorman is on a roll with the Ashan brand and as a result, this was our top selling domestic Chardonnay of 2015. Just enough oak to keep the Napa crowd happy, with enough acidity to keep the wine geeks in line. A fantastic value as well.

Chinook Yakima Valley Semillon 2013 \$17.99

Kay and Clay from Chinook have been making some of the most compelling and consistent whites in Washington for 30 years now and even though this wine is no longer called 'Topaz', it still harkens back to the 'old days'. Honey, beeswax, melon and pear, with lemon peel acidity.

Jones of Washington Ancient Lakes Pinot Gris 2014 \$13.99

As of late, I have preferred many Washington Pinot Gris to the much more famous versions from Oregon, and here is a classic example. Bright fruit with notes of the tropics and citrus with bracing acidity to finish it off. Delicious stuff.

Lobo Hills

Roth Rock Farm, Yakima Valley Chenin Blanc 2014 \$22.99

What was once one of Washington's signature whites (back in the early 1980's) is making a comeback in a big way, and white wine master Tony Dollar has hit the nail on the head with this one. Rich and silky with lots of natural acidity. A real treat, even if hardly any was made.

Thurston Wolfe Washington State 'PGV' 2014 \$14.99

When Wade and Becky came out with this Pinot Gris / Viognier blend a few years back, it was a bit of a novelty. However, it has become one of the textbook examples of what forward thinking in terms of blends can achieve. Simply fabulous with seafood. We cannot keep it in stock.

Our annual "oh crap, the credit card bill just arrived" value wine Tria Syrah Terre Siciliane 2014 \$8.99

We have been on a roll lately with some mind blowing values from Sicily and this is why. One of our importer buddies has stumbled upon a group of wines of such high quality and great price that we are just working our way through them. They are such astounding bargains, that breaking some our own rules is no biggie. Fat and fleshy, with spice notes, a hint of flowers and lip smacking acidity. Hard to believe it is this price, so we grabbed a bunch before he changed his mind. Load up on this one while you can.
